In my life I feel I have been given opportunities because whatever assignment or responsibility I had, I did what was expected and then a little extra. I believe this has given me the success I received in my career, my volunteer work, and my personal life.

I learned to work because I was raised on a farm. Farm work was done by the family that lived on the farm and everyone had to work to provide for the family. I had to do many different farm chores every day from the time I was old enough to help in the simplest way.

While still in high school I worked with my father in a gas station. I later went to work as a police officer for Provo City Utah. While there I not only did my job to the best of my ability I volunteered to do extra jobs. I volunteered to be the K-9 officer and worked with police dogs for five years while your grandpa Bruce was your age. He liked having the police dogs at our home. I volunteered to work and was given an assignment of traffic specialist where I made a difference for the whole city. When I was a shift supervisor I developed a training program for my shift that was then used for the whole department. It was considered to be the best police, recruit, training in the state at the time.
